People visit town to ask about star of country music

ocahontas hasn't changed much since one of its former residents took the country and western music world by storm.

There still are about 750 people, three motels, three taverns, three antique shops, three restaurants, two gas stations, a grocery store, an elementary school, a doctor's office, a real estate office, a bank and a post of-

But in the past 11 months, the quiet village between Highland and Greenville has become known all over the world as the hometown of the "Redneck Woman."

"I get people coming off (Interstate 70), and they have two questions," said Natasha Scott, 26, a cashier at Stevenson's gas station. "Where's the bathroom?' and 'Is Gretchen Wilson really from this town?"

Wilson, who lived near "Pokey" as a child, was a virtual unknown until last March. That's when Epic Records released her single, "Redneck Woman," which stayed at the top of Billboard's country singles chart for six weeks.

Wilson's album, "Here for the Party," has sold nearly 3 million copies, making her the top-selling debut artist of any genre for 2004. The Country Music Association gave her the prestigious Horizon Award in November. A week later, she was named Breakthrough Favorite New Artist at the American Music Awards.

Microbrewer set to revive old tradition

Delayed plans moving again

BELLEVILLE — After seven years of planning, Chuck Helwig is finally ready to put the city back on the map as a brewery town.

Helwig originally planned in 1997 to open the Robin's Beak microbrewery pub and restaurant at

127 Mascoutah Ave. But his wife was expecting at the time and his daughter was suffering from serious health problems, so he put his dream project off.

"Family is the most important thing," Helwig said. "So we had to focus on our priorities. Now that has all settled

down and we're ready to go." The logo for Helwig plans to invest near- Chuck Helwig's \$1 million in renovating his building, constructing a wing ery in Belleville.

where his copper brewing kettles will sit behind display windows, and demolishing an old house to make room for a parking lot.

The business — named Robin's Beak because it sounded like an old-fashioned pub and because Helwig thought it sounded "quirky" — will be a tribute to Belleville's heritage as a brewery town.

"We're going to cut out the floor on the second level, and the walls and the ceiling will have murals of Belleville at the turn-of-the-century," Helwig said. "There were 40-some-odd breweries in Belleville over the years. I've studied everything about them that I can find."

The city's last major brewery, which made Stag beer, closed in 1988.

Police now probing origin of slot machine, handguns

Investigation's focus: role of auxiliary unit

EAST ST. LOUIS — Acting Police Chief Marion Hubbard is investigating the origin of handguns and a slot machine that the head of the police auxiliary unit booked into evidence more than a week ago.

Hubbard said he has ordered Carl Brinkley, the auxiliary unit's head, to submit a report on the firearms and the slot machine.

"If we find out any discrepancy regarding any evidence that was turned in, an investigation will be conducted in regards to it," Hubbard said.

Brinkley, a retired East St. Louis Police officer, could not be reached for comment.

Hubbard said he did not know how many guns were turned in by Brinkley, nor could he describe them.

'We're just starting an investigation in regards to it, and I'm waiting until we get all the facts in there," Hubbard
