### BASE SURVIVES CUTS; GROWTH PLANNED

#### Losses at other bases mean good news here

MASCOUTAH — Scott Air Force Base survived — and grew stronger.

The announcement came at 8:05 a.m. Friday, moments after an e-mail from the Pentagon was sent to every congressman. U.S. Rep. Jerry Costello, a Belleville Democrat, got the news by cell phone from an aide in Washington, D.C., and relayed it to a crowd gathered at MidAmerica St. Louis Airport in Mascoutah.

"I can tell you with absolute certainty that Scott Air Force Base will not, I repeat, will not close," Costello announced after hanging up his cell phone.

Cheers and applause from about 200 politicians, civic leaders and local residents exploded inside the terminal before Costello could finish.

"The fact that Scott is not on the recommended closure list is great news and is the result of 10 years of hard work," said. "It's the happiest day of my career since I've been in Congress.'

Not only will Scott remain open, it will gain 797 jobs and 12 modern refueling tankers from other bases that will be closed or realigned as a result of the 2005 Base Realignment And recommendations Closure made by Defense Secretary

#### Metro-east business leaders heave a heavy sigh of relief

The metro-east dodged a \$2.1 billion-dollar bullet when Scott Air Force Base wasn't on the Department of Defense list of bases slated for closure.

That's how much money the Air Force base, which can trace its roots back to the dawn of military flight in 1917, generates for the local economy, according to Leadership Council Southwestern Illinois.

Scott employs nearly 13,000 eople, or nearly four many workers as the region's second-largest employer: metals and munitions manufacturer Olin Corp., which has 3,600 workers.

"The consequences to the whole region would have been drastic and dramatic," had the base been on the closure list, said Jerry Rombach, executive officer of the Home Builders Association of Greater Southwest Illinois. "I

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#### Jobs, 2nd four-star general are coming

Scott Air Force Base not only escaped closing, it also gained from the closure and realignment of less-fortunate bases nationwide and overseas.

The addition of new missions, nearly 800 new jobs and possibly another four-star general during the 2005 round of Base Realignment and Closures surprised and thrilled U.S. Rep. Jerry Costello, who has been described by his fellow politicians as the "patron saint of Scott Air Force Base." He said the package significantly strengthens Scott for the future.

"The announcement that we will have 12 KC-135Rs (aerial refueling planes) coming is a big deal," said Costello, a Democrat from Belleville. "We will be getting rid of the older models and replacing them with the new models. What that means is for the next 10 years we don't have to worry about trying to get money into the defense appropriation bills to replace planes."

The 126th Air Refueling Wing of the Illinois National Guard at Scott will receive the newer planes to replace the base's eight aging, noisy and corroding KC-135E Stratotanker refueling aircraft. The guard unit already has retired three of the 11 planes it brought to Scott in
